

May Mental Health Focus - Anxiety, Depression, Trauma and Grief

Would you like to learn about healthy interventions and skills that can reduce the symptoms of anxiety, depression, trauma and grief? Join Dr. Rose Bricker for a discussion on these important topics that affect so many of us. The session will take place on May 5th at 1:00 pm in the Parish Center.

If you or your loved ones are experiencing the following symptoms, this program is for you:

Anxiety - excessive fear and worrying, avoiding certain things or situations to avoid triggers; a sense of panic and doom; digestive problems; feeling tired, both physically and mentally; and having trouble concentrating,

Depression - Difficulty sleeping or sleeping too much, loss of interest and motivation, anger and

irritability, feeling hopeless and helpless, fatigue, overeating or undereating.

Trauma (PTSD): Fear, anxiety, depression, eating disorders, issues with alcohol or drugs, suicidal thoughts, and/or feelings worthlessness and hopelessness.

Grief: Sadness, confusion, trouble making decisions, difficulty keeping track of responsibilities, and difficulty focusing on anything other than the loss. The physical symptoms often include fatigue, headaches, chest pains, trouble breathing, nausea, trouble sleeping, reduced or increased appetite, and joint pain.

In bringing Communion to the sick and homebound, EMHCs





This Week's Gospel & Reflection

Lk 24:35-48

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread.

While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you."

But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts?

Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have."

And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, he asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?"

They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them.

He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled."

Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them,

"Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Gospel Reflection: Why Are You Troubled?

"Why are you troubled?

And "...why do questions arise in your hearts"?

These are the very common and popular questions asked by God in the gospel. But because many are accustomed to the idea of "to see is to believe", several people are fallen.

Many won't believe unless we see it in our eyes. In this gospel, God once again showed himself and reminded us that as it is written He will come back as a resurrected Lord. Troubled hearts must not stay in each of us. God assures us that our sins have been forgiven through His crucifixion. Thus, we should be at peace, commit ourselves to trust the Lord and rejoice and be glad of his resurrection. Are you still troubled? Are your hearts still hardened by anxieties or worries?

Prayer:

Lord, we are grateful of your sacrifice for the forgiveness of our sins. You showed us the real meaning of zeal for service when you committed and sacrificed your life as a ransom for many. Please forgive us for having little faith in You. Remind us to always listen to your word and nurture our zeal for service so that we can become worthy to be called your servants. Help our lives constantly bear good fruit for You. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Peace Therapy by Keith McClellan, O.S.B., Abbey Press, St Meinrad, IN

These thoughts are from the book *Peace Therapy* which are very appropriate as we reflect on today's Gospel ("Peace be with you." Lk 24:35-48) which talks to us about Jesus' conversation with his Disciples on the Road to Emmaus.

Be at peace with yourself. Even as God calls you to growth and progress, God loves you as you are. You have worth beyond measure, for you are a child of God.

Ground yourself in values that you've chosen with intent and deliberation. Then determine where your own attitudes and actions are at war with those values. Only you can end the conflict.

Recognize if you've made resentment, distrust, hostility your armor against a world that has hurt you in the past. Commit yourself to remove this armor, piece by piece.

When there's someone with whom you have conflicts, begin to make peace in your imagination. Picture yourself at peace. Slowly enlarge the image to include the other person. Put that picture in your mind's pocket and look at it with love now and then.

Peace sees similarities among people, not threatening differences that form barriers. Identify a difference – a value, and attitude, a choice – that threatens you. Don't judge that difference, but seek to understand it.

Use a gentle voice to call family members to the telephone, for dinner, or from play. Invite rather than command; anticipate cooperation rather that resistance. Be patient. Peace comes on soft wings, not in a thundering stampede.

Be at peace with your circumstances. Allow what you have not power over to just be as it is. Where you do have power and something needs changing, do what you can and then let go. You don't have to fit everything.

Declare a personal buffer zone. Make one corner of your home a haven, a sanctuary. When you feel your temper fraying and hear your voice rising, take time out there – perhaps with a book, a poster, or an object that whispers peace to your heart.

Treasure the peace of your past. Remember the times and places you have known peace, and return there in reality or in your heart. Bring the feeling, the grace of those moments to today's challenges.

Listening to others express their feelings – including anger – is an act of peace. Don't hear just to

determine when you can inject your own words. When you're fully present in your listening, you invite another to locate the peace within.

Peace is not simply a bouquet you can hand to a friend. You can, however, be that bouquet yourself. And fragrance may entice others to transplant tiny seedlings of peace in their own hearts.

You don't have to 'make' peace yourself, but simply allow the peace of God = already present – to flow through you to others. If you block its gentle current, you force it to chart a course around you. Be a channel of peace.

Practice random acts of kindness. They will strengthen the fainthearted, confuse the hardhearted, and comfort the disheartened.

Choose your own peace theme – a favorite song or hymn or poem or prayer. Hum, read, or say it when your feel under siege.

Abortion Signature Campaign in Arizona

Outreach

As most Catholics are aware, there is a signature campaign occurring in our state sponsored by the Arizona for Abortion Access. The abortion campaign has been collecting signatures to put abortion on the ballot for 2024 to enshrine a right to unrestricted abortion with a constitutional amendment to the Arizona Constitution. Our purpose here today is to make all of you aware of this campaign so that you can make an informed decision about the signature effort. For Catholics, we emphasize that this is not a political issue, it is a moral issue.

Millions of dollars from the abortion industry are flooding into Arizona from out of state. The features of

the proposed abortion amendment are the following:

- The language in the signature campaign as well as in the proposed amendment is vague and misleading.
- It removes most safety standards at abortion clinics. Specifically, a qualified medical doctor will not be required, allowing other healthcare workers to recommend We can pray. an abortion.
- It eliminates current parental consent laws thereby keeping parents out of decision-making with their minor child.
- It has the potential of allowing late-term abortions, including the

Poor Box Program

Every quarter, the Social Awareness and Justice Ministry (SAJM) recommends local organizations that serve the poor to receive \$500 each from the "Poor Box" funds. Fr. Huy approves the recipients, Thank you for your generous donations. Our most recent recipients are:

National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) is a nationwide non-profit, grassroots organization providing nocost advocacy, education, and support

to all those affected by mental illnesses. Since 1983, NAMI of Southern Arizona has been helping individuals with mental illness and their families. Its ongoing goals are to overcome the ignorance, misinformation, misconceptions and apathy that prevent true understanding and meaningful help from reaching persons with serious mental illness. They provides same day crisis help, support groups, seven educational courses and Resource Specialists. The Resource Specialist role is to assist in learning about mental health and utilizing the mental health system already in place in our community.
