SAJM Mission Statement

Guided by the Holy Spirit and the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching, the Social awareness and Justice Ministry provides educational, advocacy and volunteer opportunities for initiatives and programs that address poverty, oppression, inequality, and other social issues. We work to take appropriate action to help bring about an improvement in these situations.



This ministry is part of an international organization that creates beautiful handmade dresses that go to many areas around the world, including Africa, Puerto Rico, South America. The dresses have a Dress a Girl label on the front and they are told that this gives the appearance that these young girls are being looked after.

This ministry began eight years ago and gathers together women who like to sew

and contribute their talents to provide

dresses to those who have none. A group of 15 to 20 women sew the dresses in their homes, and bring them to the monthly meeting at the church on the 2nd Wednesday of the month from 10-11 a.m. where they receive new fabrics and turn in finished dresses. All who like to sew and socialize are welcome!

The purpose of the Snack Pack Program is to provide supplemental food to children who are nutritionally at risk at Catalina's Coronado K-8 School. We participate with the Vista de la Montano Methodist Church in supporting this program. Some of these kids eat lunch only when they are in school as they don't have enough food at home. The Snack Pack program provides healthy nourishment when school is not in session. Each week parishioners volunteer to pack food in individual "Snack Packs" for approximately 60 children. Santa

Catalina Parish also provides the funding for this program through the generous donations of our parishioners during the annual collection.

Sister Jose was a Franciscan nun who SISTER JOSÉ WOMEN'S CENTER

Sister Jose was a Franciscan nun who dedicated her life to helping the poor. A close friend of Dorothy Day and Cesar Chavez, she followed the gospel of St. Francis and was a passionate speaker on the presence of God in the ordinary life. The Sister Jose Women's Center in Tucson is dedicated to the care and nurture of homeless women in a welcoming environment. Her legacy is in the spirit of all those who



volunteer there. Visitors to the Center come from the street, from broken homes or abuse. They bring their fears and their fatigue in a search for safety, shelter and self-respect.

At the Center, they are treated with respect and with love. The Center provides hot meals and sack lunches daily. The women can sign up for showers, laundry, or shop at the retail shop (stocked by donations). They can receive guidance by counselors or enroll in the program "Create", a curriculum of life skills and job readiness which helps the women work toward independence,



find a job, an apartment, a new life. We celebrate each individual who finds their way back into society.

Members of our ministry and parish volunteer at Sr. Jose in the kitchen, the reception desk or the retail shop. Others provide opportunities to do basic art, bead work, puzzles etc.

CHRIST CHILD / FOSTER TEENS The Christ Child Society of Tucson is a



The Christ Child Society of Tucson is a non-profit association of volunteers whose mission is service to God's children in need, regardless of race or creed. We are one of 45 chapters of the National Christ Child Society which has a presence in 22 states with over 5,600 nationwide volunteers.

Working with various community partners, we provide layettes a.k.a. "baby shower in a bag" for mothers of

newborns filled with diapers, clothing, blankets and toys. We read and provide books to elementary school children and provide foster teens with their basic hygiene needs after they are displaced from their homes.

Through donations and talented quilters, we help over 300 moms of newborns each year.



The Christ Child Society of Tucson's Wings program supports Aviva Children's Services and Casa de Los Ninos who serve foster children in the Tucson area with their basic needs after they are displaced from their homes. Through parish donations of items for the drawstring bags, we help over 400 teens each year. We collect toiletries and sew and fill drawstring bags so that teenagers who have been removed from

their homes in a crisis situation have basic hygiene items and spiritual support.

In addition to toiletries, undergarments, each teen receives a daily devotional to provide daily inspirational thoughts. For more information about this ministry, please contact/ checkout:



Communion Service is conducted weekly at the prison. Volunteers provide Communion, have a service and say the Rosary with prisoners.

Residents Encounter Christ (REC) is a volunteer opportunity which allows you to enter a prison for all or part of a 3-day retreat. This retreat helps prisoners establish strong Christian relationships during their remaining time in prison and to have a better lifestyle when released. This annual retreat is staffed by a team of volunteers, (many of whom are from Santa Catalina's parish).

Prisoners' testimonies: At the midpoint of the retreat the men were asked to share how the retreat has affected them so far. Some comments:

- Volunteers are very humble people, my pride has gotten in the way, I opened up
 to them like I have never opened up to anyone in my life before. Now I am back to
 a relationship with God and my life with Him.
- I never had time for a retreat but had heard about them. I can use my time here to become closer to God and be at peace. I feel at peace now to serve out my time.
- This retreat brought me closer to God. Thank you for sharing such personal but valuable information to know we're not alone.

As part of these goals, Casa Maria operates a soup kitchen that is open 363 days/year. Dedicated volunteers from Santa Catalina travel to Casa Maria twice each month to distribute cups of soup and lunches to hundreds of under privileged men, women and children that line up daily for these rations. In addition to the serving of the



soup and sack lunches, the parish conducts a monthly food drive to help fill the grocery bags of families in need. Items collected are then delivered by a parish volunteer to the food kitchen for distribution.

Volunteers are very positive about the overall experience as they meet the needs of this vulnerable and needy population. "One feels good about handing out a lunch or serving a bowl of soup as a part of our Catholic values to serve the hungry and the homeless."

Currently we have 2 groups of volunteers that help on the 3rd Wednesday and/or Friday of each month. We leave from Santa Catalina by 7:45am and finish up our tasks by 11 am. For more information about this ministry, please contact:

Casa Alitas is a program of Catholic Community Services. The program serves migrant families who have left their home countries to escape violence and poverty. Most are parents, children, and pregnant women from Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) provides them with documentation and an immigration hearing date and drops the families off at Casa Alitas. Hundreds of travelers arrive at the hospitality center every day.



Casa Alitas provides care, short-term shelter and

travel assistance to help to reunite the migrants with family members in the U.S. Volunteers from this ministry assist at the four shelters greeting guests, serving food, providing clean underwear and clothing and many other welcoming and supportive activities. We also organize parish drives for donations of clothing, shoes and school and activity supplies for the children in support of this wonderful Casa Alitas program.

The purpose of the Refugee Ministry is to welcome, embrace, and stand alongside newly arriving refugees and their families to help them navigate their day to day living and integrate into the Tucson community and their new country, USA. These refugees have fled violence, persecution and/ or war in their homeland hoping to find safety for themselves and their families.

The parish has welcomed and supported two refugee families in the past three years. A family of four, from Syria, has integrated well into our community and loves the USA! A family of eleven, from the democratic Republic of Congo, waited 20

years in a refugee camp before finally being welcomed into our community. This family created a great challenge to volunteers who persevered for many months in supporting this family's transitions to their new home. The children are doing well and receiving



honors in school. Plus, two of the family members have jobs and much of their success is due to the steadfast support of volunteers.

There are now more than 82 million refugees and displaced people around the world. Tucson is one of the locations for a government Resettlement Agency which handles hundreds of refugees every year. In addition to sponsoring refugee families, the ministry also does many things to welcome refugees to Tucson. Consider joining us when we welcome them as they arrive at the airport with signs, balloons and a warm smile; help Resettlement Agency personnel to set up their apartment before they arrive; donate

TROUBLED YOUTH This ministry recognizes the great need to reach out to the homeless and vulnerable teens in the area. We are currently attempting to do this in several ways.

The ministry also supports the Youth On Their Own program in Tucson, a non-profit dropout prevention agency that works to empower youth to stay in school by providing guidance and physical assistance. The parish has contributed monetarily and also in the form of collection of new clothing for the boys and girls in the program.

Local Immersion Ministry takes parishioners several times a month to Tucson, to witness first hand our homeless situation and organizations which are trying to make a difference. Specifically, LIM visits Casa Maria Catholic Worker Community, which provides meals and clothing to homeless and poor families, and to Sister Jose Women's Center, which provides meals, shelter, clothing, and counseling for homeless women. Before and after these tours, parishioners are asked to reflect on the following quotes from Mother Teresa:



- "Today it is a very fashionable day to talk about the poor. Unfortunately it is not fashionable to talk with them.
- "I want you to be concerned about your next-door neighbor. Do you know them?"
- "The most terrible poverty is loneliness and the feeling of being unloved."
- "When we touch the sick and the needed, we touch the suffering body of Christ."
