

Tenebrae Service – A Journey Through Darkness

Wednesday, April 16th | 5:30 PM | In the Church.

Step into one of the most solemn and powerful services of Holy Week—the Tenebrae Service.

Tenebrae, meaning "darkness" or "shadows," is an ancient service that draws us into the suffering and sacrifice of Christ through scripture, candlelight, and silence. As we recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of Jesus' Passion, the service leaves us in silence—unresolved—reminding us that the story is not complete until Easter.

A Gradual Darkening – Throughout the service, we extinguish candles one by one from a special candelabrum known as the "hearse," symbolizing the growing darkness as Christ approaches the Cross. Only the Christ candle remains, representing His enduring light in the midst of suffering.

A Moment of Silence & Sound — In the final moments, the church is plunged into darkness, and a loud noise—the "strepitus" (Latin for "great noise")— shatters the silence, recalling the earthquake and the tearing of the temple veil at Jesus' death.

A Time for Reflection — This powerful experience sets the mood for the coming days of the Triduum, drawing us into the mystery of Christ's Passion and preparing our hearts for the light of the Resurrection.

This is a deeply moving and unique liturgical experience that brings the reality of Holy Week into focus. We invite you to join us for this powerful service of reflection and anticipation.

Come, sit in the shadows, and journey through the Passion of Christ as we await the dawn of Easter. ‡







It's the 5th Sunday of Lent and...

...we are approaching the end of Lent. It concludes on Holy Thursday with the Mass of the Lord's Supper.

"During Lent, the Church renews the call to conversion. The new man is born in Baptism. God makes us His children and incorporates us into Christ and His Church. From the heart of a person renewed according to God, good behaviors flow. We are called to abandon sinful behaviors and to fix our gaze on what is essential" (Pope Francis).

What would be considered essential? First, it would be to look within ourselves to find the answer, beginning with our own actions and those of others. Sometimes we are so harsh in our judgments. We apply the law of the stone without mercy—hardhearted, slow to practice forgiveness. Yet You, Lord, forgive me with the gentleness of a Gospel written

on the ground, that is, on soft earth. Let us take this moment to ask Jesus for the gift of learning mercy—the same mercy He showed to the woman caught in adultery.



What must that accused woman have felt when Jesus asked her:

Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" She replied, "No one, Lord." And Jesus said to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin anymore" (John 8:10–11).

Indeed, the challenge of conversion is to sin no more. It is learning, day by day, to be good—to ourselves and to others. ©LPi 🕏

Gospel Reflection: A Path of Mercy: From Judgment to New Beginnings

In the Gospel, we witness a profound moment between Jesus and the woman caught in adultery a powerful encounter of grace and healing. While the religious leaders used the Law to condemn, Jesus created a sacred space of mercy through his gentle silence, the mysterious writing on the ground, and his simple yet powerful challenge:

"Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." (John 8:7)

Jesus invites each of us to pause and reflect on the stones we carry—the judgments against others, and perhaps even harsher ones against ourselves. He does not dismiss sin or pretend it doesn't matter; instead, he offers us a new path beyond judgment and condemnation where healing becomes possible.

When Jesus speaks to the woman, he extends compassion while gently encouraging her toward change:

"Neither do I condemn you. Go, and

from now on do not sin any more." (John 8:11)

This is the essence of true transformation. It's not just about avoiding punishment, but about embracing a new beginning offered by Christ.

As we continue our Lenten journey toward Holy Week, let's reflect together:

- Where do I need Christ's mercy most deeply today?
- What stones of judgment am I holding onto that Christ invites me to set down?

How can I receive Christ's forgiveness and respond genuinely to his call to "sin no more"?

Christ meets us exactly as we are—not to condemn, but to offer us grace, renewal, and healing. Let us open ourselves fully to his mercy, becoming living reflections of the compassion and forgiveness we've been given. - Fr. Huy Vu 🕆

Refreshments will be served on the patio afterwards (weather permitting). 🕆



What is the Chaplet of Divine Mercy?

The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is an intercessory prayer invoking God's mercy on the world, utilizing words drawn from the text of The Diary of St. Faustina Maria Kowalska. St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions of Christ imploring her to spread the message of his Divine Mercy, specifically through the recitation of this chaplet.

Prayed with an ordinary five-decade Rosary, the chaplet opens with a recitation of the Our Father, the Hail Mary and the Apostle's Creed. The beads usually used for the Our Father are used to recite

this prayer: "Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world." followed by ten Hail Marys and the words "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy

Righteousness, truth — that wasn't the goal. The goal was being right.

And in the middle of the whole scene, dragged before Jesus, used as a literal prop in this staged drama, is a woman. A real flesh-and-blood woman.

I find myself wanting to know more about her. She had been "caught in the act," they claimed, but I wonder what that even means. With whom was this act committed, and what were the reasons for her participation in it? Was she coerced? Was she scared? Was she confused? Was it really a cut-and-

dry, black-and-white situation of adultery, of lust, of making the wrong decision?

We will never know the answers to these questions, and it doesn't matter — it's DORMAN not our business. God knows the answers. God knows the truth of the matter: what she did, what she chose, what she felt. Because she wasn't a prop to Him. She was a person.

When God looks at us, he sees more than the worst decisions we've ever made.

I worry that we use one another as props even today, when we try like the Pharisees to illustrate "What is Right." We have a terrible tendency to see only decisions, and in doing so we dehumanize the people behind them.

If someone is interested in becoming a priest, how does he go about it?

Discerning a vocation can happen in any number of Remember that many young Catholic men have ways. It might come as a surprise to the person called or to family or friends. Sometimes it is a gradual process, and other times it is as quick and bright as lightning. Regardless of how it starts, a vocation to the priesthood or religious life requires a process of discerning, testing, and preparing. The best place to begin would be with lots of prayer, receiving the sacraments, and attending daily Mass whenever possible. Then talk to Fr. Huy or a priest you know and trust. The Diocese of Tucson has a vocation ministry and with a vocation director you may also want to talk to.


Together, we accomplished so much:
