

My Experience at the National Eucharistic Congress - Such a Blessing

Hello Dear Brothers, and Sisters in Christ,

Several weeks ago I had the blessing and privilege to attend the 10th National Eucharistic Congress, along with over 50,000 fellow Catholics.

My words cannot describe all that went on there in Indianapolis; however here is my best attempt. I attended Morning rosary, and Mass, followed by encounter sessions. The afternoons were devoted to breakout sessions, and the evenings were filled with music, speakers, and adoration.

On the opening night, the four pilgrimage routes arrived at Lucas Oil Stadium. There was Adoration of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. The people were



cheering as loudly for the Blessed Sacrament as for any sports team!

On Saturday, there was a Eucharistic Procession through the city. It ended a mile away at the Indiana War Memorial where Bishop Andrew Cozzens prayed before the Blessed Sacrament. It was the most reverent, holy scene. All the crowd adoring and praising Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. The importance of unity in the Church, devotion to the Eucharist, and the crucial role of the laity in the Church was the theme of many speakers. The evening ended with The Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of our Lord Jesus processing around the stadium. 50,000 people and

you could of heard a pin drop with the silence, reverence, and prayers being lifted up.

Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle shared that Pope Francis said "He desires the congress to lead to "conversion to the Eucharist." "The presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is a gift and the fulfillment of his mission." And "Those who choose to stay with Jesus will be sent by Jesus."

It was bitter sweet for the congress to be coming to an end. There was a peace in being with that many Catholic Christians, worshiping and receiving Jesus in the Mass and in Adoration. But it is not over! I, as well as each of you are charged with lighting a fire and not letting it be extinguished.

I pray that I can be part of setting us ablaze for Jesus and those we love and beyond.

A Brief History of the Rosary by Dan Rudden

The Rosary is a form of combined prayer and meditation that has been around for over 1200 years. Monks would recite and chant the 150 Psalms of the Bible as a major part of their worship. Since it was tough for most people to memorize the 150 psalms, they recited 150 "Our Fathers" instead.

To keep track of their prayers, people first used 150 little pebbles to keep count. Later they used a thin rope having 50 knots, 3 times for a total of 150 prayers. During the 13th century, theologians interpreted the Psalms as veiled mysteries about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. They began to write a series of Psalters, or praises to honor Jesus & 150 Psalters honoring Mary were also composed.

The interpretation the Psalters led to the implementation of meditations being attached to each bead. This innovated version of the Rosary

was widely spread by Blessed Alan de la Roche. The prayers were later broken out into sets of 10 and these groupings became known as decades. Each decade of ten "Hail Mary's" would be preceded by one "Our Father".

Around the year 1700, the thoughts used in the Rosary started to become narratives. St. Louis de Montfort composed the most common set of narratives that eventually became used as meditations for each decade of the rosary.

These narratives were divided into five Joyful, five Sorrowful, and five Glorious meditations that are referred to as "mysteries". Just recently, in 2002, Pope John Paul II introduced another set of five meditations referred to as the "Luminous Mysteries".


The Traveling Vocations Cross Program Resumes

Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

The Fullness of Life

Like any other child of the '90s raised by budget-conscious parents, I've spent my fair share of Sunday mornings in line at an Old Country Buffet, hot plate in hand. Kids ate for chump change on Sundays, and I never left that fine establishment without getting our money's worth. I always came away stuffed to the gills. But I never, ever remember feeling satisfied.

In fact, if I recall correctly, most of the time I felt rather empty. I was always thinking about the food I didn't get to eat — whatever I couldn't fit on my plate, or whatever they were bringing out from the kitchen just as we were about to leave.

As I've gotten older, it's a feeling I've encountered again and again, and not just at buffets. Haven't we all?

The people you think are perfect

reveal themselves to be deeply flawed. The things you want the most are never as satisfying to possess as they are to long for. The experiences you anticipate the most end up being letdowns, when instead it's the ordinary moments — maybe even the hard moments, the painful moments — that stand out, that become cherished memories.


Today's scripture readings equate wisdom and fullness with an acceptance of something that makes no sense, that defies scientific explanation, cultural norms, and even common sense: the Real Presence of our God in the Eucharist.

Is it strange to believe that we are consuming the Body and Blood of Christ in our worship, and that only by doing so will we ever achieve everlasting life? Perhaps. But we are asked to do many strange things as Christians. We are asked to love when we do not feel like loving, when the object of that love has not earned it. We are asked to forgive even when the recipient of that forgiveness does not seek it or merit it. We are asked to believe, in moments when belief feels impossible.

Socrates says that the only wisdom is in knowing that you know nothing. Perhaps the only spiritual fullness is in knowing that there is only emptiness to be had here in this world, that there is no physical experience or indulgence that can really make you feel satisfied and strong. That the only food that really nourishes you in a way that lasts is a small white Host you can barely taste on your tongue.

We take parishioners twice a month, to visit Casa Maria Soup Kitchen and Sister Jose's Women's Center as they serve the homeless and poor of Tucson. While on a Local Immersion tour, parishioners discuss their prior life experiences serving and supporting charitable organizations,

what they experienced on the tour, and how they could provide help and support in the future to this growing problem.

Casa Maria provides a breakfast soup and a bag lunch to approximately 450 homeless individuals, and a food bag to about 125 local families everyday, except Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Sister Jose's Women's Center provides:

- Sisters Helping Sisters Day Program, which serves homeless women three meals, showers, laundry, clothing, and personal hygiene products.
- 2) A Safe Place for Women Night Program, which offers approximately 40 women with hot meals and a safe place to sleep.
- Moving Forward Program, which provides case managers who help women enter the rental or job markets.

The tours will start up again in September. Watch the bulletin for the dates.

Outreach

Arizona Abortion Access Act

In the past, the members of our Dignity of Human Life Ministry have spoken from the pulpit about the pro-abortion signature campaign. We have also provided informative bulletin articles on this important issue. The purpose of the signature campaign by the Arizona for Abortion Access group was to get a constitutional amendment on the ballot that would enshrine unrestricted abortion in Arizona. Unfortunately, as a result of their pro-abortion signature effort, the proposed amendment may be on the ballot this November, pending verification of the signatures.


Citing the right to abortion, Article II of the Arizona Constitution will be amended by adding Section 8.1. It reads there must be "a compelling state interest to deny, restrict or interfere with an abortion" and the state cannot "infringe on an individual's autonomous decision making" to have an abortion. This

allows "absolute autonomy" for a woman making the abortion decision. What such "absolute autonomy" does not say is "do what you want as long as it doesn't hurt anyone." Sadly, "absolute autonomy" means "do what you want." It only follows that "absolute autonomy" to choose an abortion has many victims.

Families are the victims. Sister Lucia dos Santos, one of the three children who witnessed the Blessed Mother's apparitions at Fatima quoted that "the final battle between the Lord and Satan will be about the Family." The abortion amendment eliminates parental notification, thereby shutting parents out, in spite of the fact that we have always been a family-oriented culture.

Women and underage girls are the victims. Saint Mother Teresa stated: "Women and girls experience immediate and possibly life-threatening complications after

abortions."

Babies are the voiceless first victims. It's the baby's heart that is stopped by abortion. St. Mother Teresa stated: "It is a poverty to decide that a baby must die so that you may live as you wish."

Our society is also the victim. Life is our first right. Without life, no other right can be worth defending. The inalienable right affirmed by the Declaration of Independence is the right to life — whether young or old, weak or strong, healthy or handicapped.

Finally, we must stay informed and continue to pray for all who are threatened by this extreme amendment.
