

Rectory Project Update

I apologize for the lack of updates on this project due to a delay from CMA, LLC, our architectural firm. We have made progress.

Currently, we are in the design phase. The architect is working diligently with the structural and civil engineers to finish their drawings. This step could take up to 3-4 weeks. We have scheduled a meeting to review the electrical plan. The 3-D model for the rectory is in its final stages.

Once the drawings are complete, they will undergo a review and potential revisions, which we anticipate will take up to three weeks. Following this, the project will be submitted for county approval. If everything goes

according to plan, we aim to break ground in October as soon as possible.

Hospice & Palliative Care: what is the difference?

Personal

Palliative and hospice care share many similarities. Both models of care focus on symptom relief, quality of life and family involvement. Care is holistic, collaborative and delivered by a team of specially trained providers.

However, there are important distinctions that patients who are suffering from serious illness, their families and providers need to understand.

Timing

Hospice: Is for people with a terminal illness and who are not expected to live longer than 6 months. The focus is on comfort, not curing an illness.

Palliative Care: Is for people living with serious illness who may also be receiving treatment to cure their illness or prolong their life. Early referrals to palliative care are recommended.

Eligibility

Hospice: Requires hospice and attending doctors to certify that the patient is terminally ill and the patient agrees to forgo curative care. *

Palliative Care: May require a physician referral.

Care Location

Hospice: Most often provided in the place the patient calls home by a team of professionals that guides the family in taking care of the patient, but may also be provided in a hospice facility.

Palliative Care: Is provided in a variety of settings including the hospital, medical office or home in collaboration with the patient's other medical professionals.

Payment

Hospice: Is covered by Medicare Hospice Benefit, Medicaid Hospice Benefit, and most private insurance plans. In most cases hospice care is fully covered, check plan details for any exceptions.

Palliative Care: Most insurance plans, including Medicare and Medicaid, cover all or part of palliative care, just as with other hospital and medical services.

Gospel Reflection - 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Since my college days I've loved a song called "Dance with You" by the rock band

Live. It touches on the deep mystical hunger of our heart: "I've tasted all the wines/ a half a billion times/ came sickened to your shore/ you showed me what this life is for." These lines resonate with anyone who has feasted on the good things of this world only to be left spiritually hungover and unsatisfied.

We see a similar dynamic evoked by Jesus' words after he feeds the crowd with bread and fish. To teach them to hunger for God, he recalls God's gift of manna-bread for the hungry ancient Israelites.


Those folks had grown spiritually sick from the idolatrous food of Egypt yet still longed for more worthless pagan food. So, God sent heavenly bread to nourish their bodies, but also to heal their distrustful hearts. His people —

like us — must learn to hunger and thirst for God alone. Before we can receive that which will not disappoint, we first must cease expecting that earthly goods will satisfy us.

We will get to the Lord's teaching on the Eucharist in the next two weeks. But first, he asks us: do you trust me to take care of you? Do you trust me to give you what you need for each day, and to not worry about the next day? Do you see that when you hungrily stuff yourself with the things of this world you become sick and lose your taste for the bread of life? So, our hungry hearts cry out: Lord, help us to trust that you'll provide for our every need. Help us to use only what we truly need. Help

us hunger for the goodness of your Son, who is the true bread from heaven. That is what this life is for.

Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments

Food That Perishes

It's so easy to do the right thing because we want to tick all the right boxes. We want to live by the law. We want to accomplish the work of God. Or, at least, we say that we do.

But Jesus tells us that in order to accomplish the work of God, we have to believe in the one he sent. And to believe in Christ is to be filled with the spirit of truth — to do what is right because it is right, not because we want to be filled with good feelings.

What is the difference between doing what is right because you want to be a good Christian, and doing what is right because you believe in Christ?


It's the difference between eating manna and the Eucharist. One fills your stomach and keeps you alive, and nothing more. The other satisfies a hunger you might not have even known you had, or if you did know, you called it by another name — sadness, unfulfillment, fear. One achieves a corporeal goal, and that's the end of it. The other accomplishes something

invisibly, secretly, silently, and though there is physical evidence of its work all around us, you have to be shrewd to recognize it.

It's the difference between making a social media post condemning sin and enveloping a sinner (the one at our dinner table, the one on the street, the one staring back at us in the mirror) with love and concern. It's the difference between simply going to Mass and living the Gospel. It's the difference between speaking to God and saying a prayer. It's the difference between telling someone they're wrong and telling them about the truth.

There's nothing wrong doing what is right because we long for heaven, and there's nothing wrong with eating manna if you're starving. But that alone isn't enough. We must also long for the bread of heaven, the bread that gives life to the world.

Convocation for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion in Home Bound, Nursing Home, Hospital and Prison Ministry

On Saturday, July 20, 2024, Catholic Community Services, (St. Jeanne Jugan Ministry with Elders) hosted a convocation with Bishop Weisenberger. After an 8 AM Mass in the Cathedral, a six-hour convocation was held at the Bishop Kicanas Pastoral Center.

The keynote speaker was Msgr. Jeremiah McCarthy, Ph.D., professor of Moral Theology, Oblate School of Theology, San Antonio, TX.

This convocation was for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion in Home Bound, Nursing Home, Hospital and Prison Ministry.

Key takeaways from Bishop Edward:

- 1) Make your ministry a 'ministry of presence' because 90% of caregiving work is making sure that those you are visiting know you care.
- 2) Be open to learn from whomever God puts in front of you.
- 3) Never underestimate why God put you in a certain place at a certain time.

Msgr. Jeremiah McCarthy talked about "End of Life Health Care — a Catholic Perspective". He addressed our mortality, questions about dying, the spiritual tradition of the Church, and the art of dying well. He supported what Bishop Edward said

by stating the well-known medical adage: "cure sometimes, relieve occasionally, but care always."

My key takeaways:

- I) Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion can give Viaticum (administering Eucharist to a person who is dying with or without Anointing of the Sick). Viaticum is thus a part of the Last Rites. There are only 147 priests in the Diocese of Tucson therefore it is sometimes impossible to have a priest at a loved-one's bedside at end-of-life.
- 2) I should make sure my family knows I am an organ donor, so that they are not confused by the procedures that must occur at the end of life (i.e they must keep the donor alive via machine while they harvest the organs requiring the family to leave the room.)
- Cremation the Catholic Church as of 1997 allows the celebration of the funeral Mass with the cremated remains present.
- 4) Catholic Community Services' Kolbe Prison Ministry is starting a Hospice ministry in AZ Prisons if we can find enough volunteers. -Deb Auclair

Month 5 – Developing Baby – "Mommy felt me kick today!"
