



Forgiveness is central to His Great Commandment of Love: Love your God, love your neighbor, love yourself— even your enemy— as "I have loved you." Yet, many of us reject this teaching. We refuse to forgive those who have abused and hurt us and we even refuse to forgive ourselves for

When we are trapped inside unforgiving hearts, we are out of right-relationship with God, ourselves and others. And clearly, we can't expect God or others to forgive us for our failings if we remain unwilling to forgive.

Redemption begins in our hearts. It requires love, forgiveness and reconciliation. If you are suffering from an unforgiving heart, this retreat is for you. It will help you set your heart free from the pain of the past. T



Saints Who Fostered Vocations to the Priesthood

Saint Justin Russolillo (died 1955)

"The Lord created me exclusively and totally for himself.... He wants me as his priest, for himself, as if he couldn't live without me. In fact, without the priest, he would not live his Eucharistic life. He willed it, and he willed me!" Born near Naples in 1891, Justin was a devout child, who loved reading the lives of the saints and made his first communion at five. But his wish to enter the seminary was complicated by family finances. When a request of help from a generous landowner was denied, his mother told him, "Don't be afraid, Justin, your mother will send you to the seminary even if she has to pawn her eyeballs."

Justin was ordained a priest in 1913. At his ordination

he promised to spend his life cultivating religious vocations. He was very good at working with young people and helping them discern calls to consecrated life. He knew from experience the financial burden a vocation could bring and yearned to alleviate it.

After many setbacks, he opened his first "Vocationary", a home where young men could live while discerning their call. He also founded the Society of Divine Vocations, a congregation dedicated to fostering vocations. Justin died of leukemia in 1955. He was beatified in 2001 and canonized in 2022.

Inviting Jesus into Your Home: Gospel Reflection

"When you invite Jesus into your home, you're never quite the same again."

When Peter first invited Jesus to his home, the first thing Jesus did was to cure Peter's mother-in-law (Mk 1:31). When Jairus, the synagogue official, invited Jesus to his home, the first thing Jesus did was to restore life to Jairus' daughter, who had just died (Mk 5:41). Neither Peter's family nor Jairus' family was ever the same again. Then there was a leading Pharisee who invited Jesus to dinner one day, and one of the first things Jesus did was to heal a sick man at his house (Lk 19:8).

These are just a few examples of how people invited Jesus into their homes and were never the same again. These examples make us ask ourselves, "Have we ever consciously invited Jesus into our home, in a practical way?"


Ready or not, we have arrived at Ordinary Time. Christmas has come to an end. Now, each Sunday's Gospel will gradually

present us with the image of Jesus in His public life. Jesus introduces the Kingdom of God with a celebration, a wedding. With this, the rigid sense of puritanism is transformed, and certain protocols of the Law are broken. The water jars, filled and waiting unknowingly, became part of Jesus' first miracle: turning water into wine. This note of joy, of celebration and enjoyment, is good news. Jesus shows us that, despite life's hardships, suffering, and failures, there is hope. How can we add a spark of joy to our faith? Can you think of something to

This week's Gospel reading about the Wedding at Cana reminds us that Jesus desires to be present in the ordinary moments of our lives, transforming them into something extraordinary. Just as he turned water into wine, bringing joy to the wedding feast, he longs to enter our homes and bring his grace and peace. But what does it mean to invite Jesus into our homes today? Certainly, it involves more than just having a picture of Him on the wall. It means creating a space where His presence is felt – through prayer, through acts of service to one

another, and through decisions that reflect His values.

Perhaps this week we can open our hearts and our homes to Christ, allowing Him to transform us just as He transformed the lives of Peter, Jairus, and countless others. - Father Huy Vu

There is also another teaching here—the example of Mary, the

Mother of Jesus, who was attentive during that celebration and noticed that the wine had run out. She knew how to place the problem in the hands of the One who could resolve it and gave the following instruction: "Do whatever He tells you" (John 2:5). Immediately, she disappeared from the scene, leaving all the spotlight on Jesus. What should I learn from Mary? That she leads us to Jesus, and every time I do a good deed, it should point others to Him, not to me. ©LPi 🏗

Obituary: William John Krueger Aug. 03, 7934 - Dec. 17, 2024

William John Krueger, 90, of Tucson, Arizona, a beloved husband, father, grandfather, and greatgrandfather, passed away peacefully in his home on December 17, 2024. All 6 of his children were able to get into town to be with him before he died.

Born on August 3, 1934, in Chicago, Illinois, William spent much of his early life in the Wauconda area, where he met the love of his life, Patricia. They married in 1951 and shared 73 years of a loving partnership, raising six children together: Bill (Kris), Claudia (Mike), Darcy, Kelly (Jim), Dan (Joan), and Ryan (Christina). Their family grew to include 14 grandchildren-Kimberly, Bill, Cara, Bache, Jon, Lindsay, Cassie, Danny, Alex, Austin, Rachel, Drew, Samantha, and Natalie-and 9 great-grandchildren: Jack, Sophie, Gio, Cece, Kris, Cole, Kennedy, Stetson and James, all of whom brought him immense pride and joy.

William found his greatest happiness in staying connected to his family, always knowing what everyone was up to and ensuring those he loved felt supported and cherished.

A man of deep faith and commitment, William served as a deacon in the Catholic Church for over



50 years. He was deeply devoted to his work in ministry and helping others whenever he could, leaving an indelible mark on countless lives. William was a man you definitely wanted on your side-loyal, strong, and unwavering in his support for those he loved.

To celebrate his extraordinary life, a Mass was held at 12:00 pm, January 18, 2025 at St. Elizabeth Anne Seton Church in Tucson. William's legacy of love, faith, and devotion to family will forever live on in the hearts of those who knew him.

Who Was St. Anthony and Why Do We Pray to Him to Help Us Find Lost Items?

St. Anthony of Padua, also known as St. Anthony of and other difficult Lisbon, is one of the most beloved saints in the Catholic Church.

St. Anthony was born into a wealthy family and received a comprehensive education, particularly in theology and scripture. Initially, he joined the Augustinian Order, but after being inspired by the martyrdom of Franciscans in Morocco, he decided to become a Franciscan friar. His early desire to preach in Morocco was cut short by illness, which led him back to Europe. It was in Italy that his exceptional gift for preaching and profound understanding of scripture earned him recognition within the Franciscan Order and beyond.

Known as the "Hammer of Heretics," St. Anthony was renowned for his ability to communicate complex theological truths in simple, relatable terms. His vivid imagery and heartfelt passion made him a favorite among the common people. His ministry was marked not only by his words but also by his actions, as he dedicated his life to aiding the poor and marginalized.

Patron Saint of Lost Items (and Causes)

St. Anthony's association with lost items and lost causes is deeply rooted in stories from his life. One notable incident involves the recovery of a book of psalms that was dear to him. A novice monk, who had stolen the book, experienced a profound change of heart after St. Anthony's fervent prayers. The monk returned the book and rejoined the religious order. This event solidified St. Anthony's reputation as a helper in recovering lost items and resolving seemingly hopeless situations. Over time, people began to seek his intercession not only for material losses but also for spiritual and emotional struggles, including lost relationships, lost faith,

circumstances.

Beyond this specific event, St. Anthony's compassionate spirit and willingness to help anyone in need further cemented his reputation.



During his lifetime, his prayers often resulted in miraculous outcomes, and after his death, reports of miraculous recoveries of lost items or solutions to impossible situations continued to grow. These stories spread widely, reinforcing the belief in his special ability to assist with lost causes.

St. Anthony died in Padua, Italy, on June 13, 1231, at the age of 36. His sanctity was so widely recognized that Pope Gregory IX canonized him in 1232, just one year after his death. In 1946, Pope Pius XII declared him a Doctor of the Church, acknowledging his theological contributions.

Today, he is venerated as the patron saint of lost or stolen items, the poor, travelers, mail carriers, and pregnant women. His feast day is celebrated on June 13.

A popular prayer reflects his enduring role as a helper in times of need: "St. Anthony, St. Anthony, please come around; something is lost and cannot be found."

This simple invocation captures the trust and devotion that countless individuals have placed in him over the centuries. Often depicted holding the Christ Child, a lily, or a book, St. Anthony's imagery symbolizes his purity, wisdom, and spiritual closeness to God.
