Breaking New Ground: Our Parish Rectory

A Sign of Hope: Rectory Groundbreaking and Project Update

What a joyful milestone we celebrated together last Thursday, May 15th. Over 150 parishioners joined Bishop Kicanas and me for our Rectory Groundbreaking Mass and Blessing. It was a beautiful expression of faith as we blessed the very land where our future rectory will soon stand, just south of our Prayer Garden.



Why We're Building This Home

This rectory is a testament to our shared vision. In Fall 2023, we launched our campaign to provide a dedicated home for the Redemptorist priests who serve Santa Catalina. Our priests currently commute 45 minutes each way to meet the sacramental and pastoral needs of Santa Catalina. Thanks to your incredible generosity and overwhelming support, by Spring 2024, we had already raised 90% of the needed funds and began the design process.

We envisioned a home that nurtures both ministry and hospitality. Though we experienced delays due to diocesan transitions and contractor changes, we adopted a new strategy late last year by partnering with a general contractor to define the scope and move the project forward. The plans have since expanded to include a small chapel and powder room, truly creating a space that serves both our priests and parish family.

Project Progress:

- Building Permit: We submitted the final application to Pima County on May 5. While we celebrated the groundbreaking on May 15, we anticipate receiving the permit in the coming weeks.
- Well and Septic: Permits for the private well and septic system have been approved. This is wonderful progress. We expect well drilling to begin around June 1.
- Utilities: Like the Parish Hall, the rectory will use propane for heating and hot water, and a septic system for sewage.

Safety Reminder: Please note that the south side of the Memorial Wall is now an active construction zone. For your safety, we kindly ask everyone to stay on the north side. Viewing openings have been trimmed so you can safely observe progress.



Looking Ahead to June:

We are eagerly anticipating these next steps:

- Receiving our full building permit.
- Beginning the vital well drilling. Starting soil grading to manage runoff and prepare the foundation. We hope to soon share a visual rendering of the rectory in the church narthex, so you can see what your generosity is helping us bring to life.

Thank you for continuing to walk this journey of faith with us. As we move through the Jubilee Year of Hope, may this rectory remain a concrete sign of God's ongoing faithfulness and the power of your generosity. May it be a reminder that the Church grows not only brick by brick, but heart by heart. - Fr. Huy Vu

Stephen Ministry provides emotional and spiritual care to those in our parish and community who are going through a crisis or life difficulty. Through one-to-one, Christ-centered caring relationships, we walk faithfully with them to bring Christ's love and healing into their lives.

Stephen Ministry has been serving our parish since 2011 and has brought help, hope, and healing to well over one hundred people. Here are some testimonials from our care receivers:

"Thanks be to God and to Stephen Ministry. Thank you for... putting my Stephen Minister in my path. She was the person who helped me in the process of recovering from my loss, my angel in the moment that my heart was broken."

"My spouse of 66 years died one year ago from complications of Parkinson's disease, dementia, delusions, and painful disabling arthritis. As her care giver for almost 30 years the eventual stress of 24/7 care was exhausting. One year after her death 1 was still grieving. Emotionally, 1 was shut down. The Stephen Ministry program was recommended. Each week my Stephen Minister listened. 1 eventually got talked out. He still listened. His comments and

observations were spiritual, nonjudgmental, and helped me understand my loss. I am on my way to a life I can live peacefully knowing my spouse is past suffering."



"We lost our third son to SIDS in 1978. Our marriage almost fell apart. I felt that I could never ever endure the loss of another child. However, my second son died suddenly, and I am still alive. I had become so angry at God for taking my sons. I'd go outside and scream from the pain. My Stephen Minister became my confidant. She is always so understanding and never judgmental. Other family crises and deaths have occurred since my son's death, and my Stephen Minister has listened, helped, and prayed. She has been a pillar to help with the healing and reinforce my confidence in God's love for me."

Sunday's Readings (June 1, 2025)

First Reading: They said, "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven." (Acts 1:11)

Psalm: God mounts his throne to shouts of joy: a blare of trumpets for the Lord. (Ps 47)

Second Reading: May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of him. (Eph 1:17)

Gospel: As he blessed them he parted from them and was taken up to heaven. (Lk 24:51)

It was a Delta flight from Salt Lake City to Phoenix, and it looked like an on-time departure. As the large plane rolled away from the gate, the pilot announced over the intercom: "Ladies and Gentlemen, the crew

outside didn't fill up the tanks with fuel. We are going back to the gate to wait for them." The passengers groaned with impatience. But over the next hour, we knew the waiting had a purpose: it meant fuel to get us to our destination.

The disciples at the Lord's Ascension are in a similar predicament but on a massively higher plane. They want the Kingdom of God to begin on earth as it is in heaven. But Jesus says, "I am sending the promise of my Father

upon you; but stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49). They stay together in prayer in Jerusalem and wait nine long days until the Holy Spirit descends. Empowered by

the ends of the earth and to their deaths proclaiming the Good News of Jesus. The wait was worth it.

Before you begin a task or endeavor, do you take time to patiently pray for the Holy Spirit to come? The bigger the task, the more ardent the prayer should be. Try it this week, and you'll be clothed with power to get where God wants you to go.




Wait...Don't We Celebrate The Ascension on a Thursday - 40 Days After Easter?

Traditionally observed 40 days after Easter, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord falls on a Thursday, recalling the biblical account in Acts 1:3 that Jesus appeared to His disciples for 40 days before ascending into heaven. However, in most dioceses across the United States, this feast is now celebrated on the Seventh Sunday of Easter. This shift, authorized by the Vatican and approved by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops

(USCCB), reflects pastoral considerations aimed at fostering greater participation in this important solemnity.

In 1999, the USCCB voted to allow each ecclesiastical province—the groupings of dioceses overseen by a metropolitan archbishop—to decide whether to transfer the Ascension to Sunday. Most provinces opted for the transfer, citing the practical reality that many Catholics are unable to attend weekday Masses.



By moving the Ascension to Sunday, more faithful are able to reflect on Christ's return to the Father and His ongoing presence through the Holy Spirit.

If the Ascension were still observed on Thursday, the Gospel reading for the Seventh Sunday of Easter would typically come from John 17:11b—19. In this passage, Jesus prays for His disciples' unity, protection from the evil one, and sanctification in truth.

This rich Gospel—part of Jesus' "high priestly prayer"—remains a powerful message of Christ's desire for His Church, and is still proclaimed in provinces that retain Ascension Thursday as a Holy Day of Obligation.

Ultimately, the shift reflects the Church's pastoral flexibility while maintaining the theological integrity of the Easter season. \$\frac{1}{4}\$

You can tell a lot about a person by how they wait in line.

Stewarding Hope: 5-16-25 A Retreat with Fr. Steve Rehrauer

Father Steve Rehrauer, C.Ss.R., director of the Redemptorist Renewal Center and Ph.D. in moral theology, Here is a summary of his thoughts.

In a world overflowing with abundance — especially in the West — we paradoxically find ourselves more anxious, isolated, and disillusioned than ever. While billions still struggle for access to food, water, and basic resources, many in developed nations find themselves battling despair. Nearly 80 years ago, moral theologian Bernard Häring warned of this exact spiritual crisis: without faith, he said, hope becomes nearly impossible to sustain.

Fr. Steve Rehrauer, C.Ss.R., invites us to confront this challenge through the lens of *The Church Year of Hope*, drawing on the spirituality of St. Alphonsus Liguori and the Redemptorist charism. In this retreat, we'll explore what it means to be stewards of hope in an age where pessimism has quietly become the dominant worldview.

Hope is not mere optimism. Optimism and pessimism are temperaments; hope is a virtue. It is rooted not in circumstance but in God's promise. And like all virtues, it requires cultivation.

Stewardship plays a vital role in this cultivation. Stewardship is not about control or possession; it's about care, accountability, and trust. A steward manages what belongs to someone else, and does so faithfully with love and reverence. As disciples of Christ, we are stewards of His mission — a mission of hope.

Jesus Himself modeled this in John 6:37–40, stating that He came not to do His own will, but the will of the One who sent Him. In religious life, a superior may entrust a vicar to act on their behalf. Similarly, we are entrusted to carry forward Christ's message of hope, mercy, and redemption.

This retreat will explore how the theological virtues — faith, hope, and love — help us orient our lives around God's truth. They remind us that prayer is not just a



spiritual practice, but a proclamation of hope. As St. Alphonsus taught, prayer is itself an act of hope — without it, our hope withers.

We encounter signs of hope in four key places:

- 1) The Crib the Incarnation: God with us
- 2) The Cross the sacrifice of redemption
- 3) The Eucharist Christ's enduring presence
- 4) Mary our model and mother in hope

Supernatural hope becomes crucial as we age and encounter loss, pain, and uncertainty. It tells us that the best is yet to come — not because we earn it, but because God promises it.

Stewarding hope also includes acknowledging its healing power. Even science confirms that hope improves outcomes, brings comfort, and fosters resilience. Philosopher Josef Pieper reminded us that both hope and despair are decisions — acts of the will that shape our response to life's trials.

Ultimately, our identity as children of God is the source of lasting hope. Everything we have should be used to glorify God and uplift others. In doing so, we become vessels of love — and living answers to someone else's prayer.


Andy's Irrigation gives a Shout Out to our Prayer Garden

If you seek peace in a troubled world, walk this beautiful Prayer Garden. You will find comfort here. 🕆








