

If God is good, why is there evil in the world?

The problem of evil is perplexing. If God is all-powerful and all-good, why doesn't He stop bad things from happening? He must either not be all-powerful, or perhaps He's not very good after all. God does not force us into moral perfection. We are not forced to love Him or to love our neighbor. We must make the decision ourselves. This means, of course, that we

One small decision of selfishness, jealously, or pride may not seem so bad. But every decision — good or bad — is like a stone dropped into a still pond. The ripples extend much farther than the original stone. When decisions against love begin to compound, they affect families, neighborhoods, and nations. This is all the more reason for Christians to be faithful to our baptismal call to love one another as Christ has loved us! ©LPi &

First Reading: And when they arrived, they called the church together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles. (Acts 14:27)

Second Reading: 1 heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them as their God." (Rv 21:4)

Gospel: I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. (Jn 13:34)

Spiritual

Gospel Reflection:

I've always found it amazing that Jesus never says to the cross. We weren't there when he did that, but his disciples the straightforward and bumper stickery words "I love you" or "I will always love you" (a la Dolly Parton's song). Why doesn't Jesus say, "I love you"?

Well, actually he does, but in particular ways. He says, "As the Father loves me, so I love you" (John 15:9) thereby rooting his love for us in the space of the Holy Trinity. This week he commands, "Love another as I have loved you" (John 13:34). He presents his love for us as a completed action which continues into the present moment. How has he loved us? By becoming one of us, one with us, and finally giving his life for us in his suffering on

neither were his Apostles (except one). Still, that action is his great "I love you" to us.


His love is also hedged in a command: "Love one another." So how can we practically follow it? The great St. John XXIII wrote in his diary that each day he followed this rule: "Only for today, I will do one good deed and not tell anyone about it." The hidden nature of a good deed is a sign that it is truly loving. This week, take on St. John XXIII's practical method of following Jesus' great commandment of love. It's a splendid way to say, "I love you."— Father John Muir ©LPi 🕆

The Depth Behind the Word 'Love'

The word love is very overused; it's used too casually in our language. When we say it, we may not reflect on the depth of this word. We make so many false promises of love. We tell our spouse, children, friends, and so many others that we love them, when in reality, it isn't true.

On this Easter Sunday, Jesus once again extends His invitation to love—to give one's life for the beloved. "I give you a new commandment: love one another.

As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (John 13:34). And He adds one more phrase to firmly anchor the meaning of love in our hearts: "This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John



13:35).

This is Gospel love; this goes far beyond simply saying the word love. Gospel love is lived out in life's most difficult challenges when setbacks force us to act, even when we don't want to. In this way, we glorify God through any kind of suffering. This is the self-giving that elevates the Gospel. This is how we learn to love: life teaches the heart to turn toward love.

Reflect on this: In what area of your life have you experienced the love of Jesus? If Jesus were to say to you, "Love as I have loved you," what would your response be? Ultimately, only Jesus can help us renew the way we love others. ©LPi 🕆

She said: "You resemble her."


I wept on the way home.

Saints Who Fostered Vocations to the Priesthood.

MAGNIFICAT, July 2024; Vol. 26, No. 5, -used with permission Blessed Ignatius de Azevedo (Died: 1570) (Feast: July 17)

Ignatius de Azevedo was born to Portuguese nobles around 1526. He became the administrator of his father's extensive estates at eighteen. But he renounced his worldly prospects after hearing the preaching of Jesuit Father Francisco Estrada.

He joined the Jesuits and was ordained a priest in 1553. He served as a college rector in Lisbon and Braga before Saint Francis Borgia appointed him inspector for mission seemed to be a failure, their deaths inspired the Jesuit missions in Brazil. He returned after two years, eager to bring more missionaries to gather in the harvest there. His efforts were rewarded with seventy

volunteers, many of them either students or novices. After five months of preparation, the group set sail for Brazil. On board the

ships, he hoped to establish a ship's school to educate orphans and immigrants.



But the so-called Wars of Religion between French Calvinists (Huguenots) and Catholics had begun. The ship fell into the hands of Huguenot pirates, and all Jesuits but one were cruelly martyred. Though their greater commitment in the missions. In 1999, an underwater monument was established at the site of their martyrdom. 🕆

Hail Mary, Explained The words of the Hail Mary — undoubtedly the most recognizable Catholic prayer after the Lord's Prayer — are deeply rooted in scripture. The opening lines of the prayer are taken from the words of the angel Gabriel at the Annunciation — "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee." This line is known as the Angelic Salutation. The following words — "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus"

— echo the sentiments expressed by Elizabeth at the Visitation. The Angelic Salutation is regarded as the earliest devotional prayer to Mary, since it forms the very first words spoken to her as the Mother of God, but Catholics did not begin to utilize the Hail Mary prayer in its current form until around the 11th century.

An in-depth explanation of each line of this prayer is provided in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2676-2677. ©LPi 廿

Dignity of Human Life at End of Life

The Dignity of Human Life Ministry has been most visible to our parish in recent times through our actions to protect unborn and newly born children, for example the Spiritual Adoption Program, participation in the annual Diocesan March for Life and efforts to defeat pro-abortion state legislation. Protecting the dignity and sanctity of life is vital not only in the early stages of life, but also as we face the end of our natural life. There is an ever-growing need for ministry to those who are dealing with end-of-life situations. For this reason, we are launching an exciting new initiative that will serve people at this stage of their life.

Whom will we serve? We will serve the aged who are facing natural death; people with a life-threatening condition such as terminal illness, hospice, or hospitalization in a life-threatening situation; people at risk of suicide; people threatened by euthanasia; and others.


How will we serve? We will serve in multiple ways. We

will assess the needs of individuals facing the end of life and work with other ministries at our parish to meet their needs. We will increase awareness of issues

In Closing

Epiclesis refers to the liturgical moment when the priest invokes the Holy Spirit to descend upon the gifts of bread and wine—or upon a person or object—to bring about sanctification, transformation, or blessing. The term comes from the Greek word epikaleo, meaning "to call upon" or "to invoke."

The most prominent example of epiclesis occurs during the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass. Just before the consecration, the priest extends his hands over the bread and wine and prays for the Holy Spirit to come upon these offerings so that they may become the Body and Blood of Christ. This moment highlights our belief that it is not by human power but by the action of the Holy Spirit that the transformation takes place.

Epiclesis is also found in other sacraments. In

What is Epiclesis?

Confirmation, the bishop invokes the Spirit to seal the candidate with grace. In the Anointing of the Sick, the priest prays for healing and strength through the Spirit. During Holy Orders, the bishop lays hands on the candidate and calls down the Spirit to consecrate him for priestly ministry.

This powerful gesture—often seen when the priest extends both hands with palms facing downward—is more than symbolic. It expresses the Church's dependence on God's divine action and the central role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church. Epiclesis reminds us that the sacraments are not merely rituals, but encounters with the living God, brought about through the Spirit's presence.
